

Year 7 have focused on the craft of storytelling this year, through their own writing and the reading of other stories. We close the year by looking at a selection of Ancient Tales, complementing the students' study of Greek Theatre and Myth in Drama.

One of our Ancient Tales originates from Ethiopia and Eritrea in Africa. What follows is an exemplary research homework from a Y7 student.



Information about Ethiopia and Eritrea

Ethiopia

Geography

Ethiopia is a country on the east coast of Africa. It is bordered by other African nations such as Djibouti, Kenya, Somalia, Sudan, and Eritrea. Ethiopia is a hot and mountainous country with a wide variety of wildlife. Ethiopia's central region is dominated by a huge plateau, which is rocky and covers two thirds of the country. The plateau is split in half by the Great Rift valley, that stretches all the way from Syria to Mozambique. The Great Rift Valley is a deep scar in the Earth's crust. The majority of Ethiopia is fertile and craggy, which makes it ideal for farming, which is the most common occupation for Ethiopians. The highlands are the coolest part of the country, and much of the farming occurs here, away from the scorching deserts that lie in the lowlands towards the border with Djibouti. The area of Ethiopia is 1,157600sq kilometres, and there is a population of almost 57 million people. The official language is Amharic, and the main religions are Christianity, Islam, and Traditional African religions. Though Amharic is the official language, there are over 80 different languages commonly spoken between the vast number of different peoples that lie within the borders of Ethiopia. The capital of modern-day Ethiopia is Addis Ababa.

History

Ethiopia has one of the oldest civilisations in Africa. Legend states that Menelik, the son of King Soloman and the Queen of Sheba, ruled Ethiopia around 1000BC. A powerful prosperous Arab nation called Aksum grew up there in around AD100, but by AD330 was Christian, and by the Middle Ages, Ethiopia was ruled by Christian Emperors. During the 1800s, Ethiopia manged to hold onto its independence. Italy managed to dethrone the current Ethiopian Emperor, Haile Selassie, but he later returned. By 1970, Haile Selassie was growing unpopular, and his government was accused of corruption. After many protests and the mutiny of the army, Haile Selassie was overthrown in 1974. After that, years of rebellions and military rule crippled Ethiopia, in addition to the thousands of refugees flooding in from Sudan. By 1990, Peace had been restored, but drought forced many farmers out of rural areas and into big cities like the capital, Addis Ababa.



Eritrea

Geography

Eritrea is another African country, bordering Ethiopia, Sudan and Djibouti. It is a small country on the coast of the Red Sea. Most of the land is covered in mountains and desert, and the narrow coastal plain is home to some of the hottest locations on Earth. In the port city of Mitsiwa, the average annual temperature is 31 degrees Celsius. It is not easy to grow crops in the harsh landscape, but irrigation projects have made farming possible in some areas, however only 5% of the land is cultivated, and many Eritreans live a nomadic lifestyle. And herd domestic animals like sheep and goats. The country has a rich mix of peoples that speak many languages, like Saho and Arabic, though Tigrinya is the official language. The capital of Eritrea is Asmera, and the main religions are Christianity and Islam. The main exports of the small African country are hides, cement and salt. The population is around 3.5 million, and the area is 93,680sq kilometres.

History

Eritrea became an independent nation in 1993 after a long guerrilla war. Previously, it had been a province of Ethiopia, and they have shared a history since AD300, when Ethiopia became part of the kingdom of Aksum. Since then, Eritrea has been and Italian, then British colony before joining back with Ethiopia in 1952.
