

Upon evaluating the initial roll-out, we will look to provide students in all other years with access to the Bromcom Student App during the next half term.

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
Home Learning

BUBBLE MAP

What is it and why is it useful?


Used to describe something in a concise way. To create this, you put a key idea or 'thing' in the centre bubble and then in each bubble around this you add key words, definitions and facts.



What can be done with it?

Write a paragraph to explain your key idea or 'thing' using the key words and terminology in the bubbles.

Add further bubbles with more information from further research



FLOW MAP

What is it and why is it useful?

The flow map is used to sequence and place in order events, actions, information etc. It might place in order the stages of a design process or the events in a book. It is very useful to synthesise a story or narrative. Each new event is placed in a new box ensuring they are in order.

What can be done with it?

A great one to do before completing a task or problem to provide a structure and plan. Give your flow map to someone else to see if they can follow it — is the order logical and sequenced correctly? Summarise the steps in a paragraph.



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
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Home Learning cont...

MULTI-FLOW MAP (Cause and effect)

What is it and why is it useful?

A Multi-Flow Map helps you to look at the causes and outcomes of an event. Put an event in the centre box first. The, in the boxes on the left add the causes of the event and in the boxes on the right add the effect (or consequences) of the event.



What can be done with it?

Put multi-flow maps together to see how events all link together.

Draw more boxes leading off the effects boxes to show how the consequences or effects create further events.

Explain causes and effects to a friend or family member.

Use it to predict the outcomes of an event (like a science experiment).

SANTA IS COMING



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St John's School Writers

Year 8 have been studying Detective Fiction this term and are reading a selection of Sherlock Holmes short stories. This is a strong example of an essay on the characterisation of Dr Roylott in 'The Speckled Band'.

Character Essay - Dr Roylott from 'The Speckled Band', Sir Arthur Conan Doyle

Dr Roylott is the main antagonist in 'The Speckled Band'. His strong, aggressive, mad and intriguing attributes makes him fit for this role perfectly.

Dr Grimsby Roylott can be seen to have immense strength when he "stepped swiftly forward, seized the poker and bent it into a curve". The reader can see from this that he is very powerful and not a man you want to cross. This can especially be seen when he 'seized' the poker. From this, as well as being strong, we get that he is fast, snappy and grabbed it as though he was trying to strangle it.

He is also seen as an extremely tall man as he "brushed the cross-bar of the doorway and his breadth seemed to span it from side to side". This imposing trait gives the reader the impression that he is quite an aggressive looking man which, along with his strength, gives us the idea he is a well-built man.

In the extract, it is also shown to us that he is quite a mad man. His "bile-shot eyes" gives us the idea that he drinks copious amounts of alcohol. All of this information symbolises the meaning for his erratic behaviour. As well as this, it gives him a creepy edge to his character, almost as if he is a villain (which later in the book we find he is).

Roylott's character develops more when we see him say "what has she been saying to you?" screamed the old man furiously". If you look at the words "screamed" and "furiously", they usually strike the reader first. They give him an irritable, senseless and loud mannerism that a reader would think are totally out of order. These disrespectful attributes make him a sinister character. Although if we look deeper into the quote, the phrase "she been saying" pops up. This implies to the reader that he does not care what Holmes and Warson did to Miss Stoner, but cares for what information she leaked to them. This is explained further in the book when Miss Stoner states that Roylott was "uncontrollable in his anger. Last week, he hurled the blacksmith over a parapet". All of this information concludes he is delusional and only cares for himself.

This delusional mind is seen when he says "I have traced her", giving us even more of a development of his characteristics. The fact that he admitted it shows he does care who knows what he does (presumably because he thinks they're scared of him). The fact that he "traced her" shows dedication to keeping a secret to only the dark parts of his life, such as the killing of Julia Stoner and almost Helen Stoner. To add to his guarding of secrets, Helen says "I have been waiting eagerly for you', she cried". This infers that he does not let Helen meet other people and was overjoyed when she saw them and makes him sound quite sinister.

Overall, Dr Roylott is a dark, sinister man who only cares about matters of his own, which gives him the air of a horrible man you do not want to cross.
