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Nut Free School

As you will likely be aware, a significant number of our staff, students and visitors have a severe allergic reaction to nuts and peanuts. Severe allergic reactions result in anaphylaxis.

Nuts and Peanuts can cause severe allergic reactions in a wide range of ways. A person with an allergy does not have to eat nuts or peanuts to have a severe reaction, this can be caused by surface contact and airborne particles. This allergy effects approximately 1/50 children and adults.



In recent years we have seen a sharp increase in snacks containing peanuts and a rise in the use of peanut butter in sandwiches.

As a school we have a responsibility to keep our students, staff and visitors safe and to reduce risk of harm. As you can imagine in a busy school environment this can be a challenge and following consideration, we feel the only way to protect those students is by removing the allergens from the school.

What this will mean?

- Peanut and nut based products will no longer be sold in the canteen.
- Students, staff and visitors will not be able to bring products containing nuts or peanuts into school.

Items that are found to break this rule will be confiscated and disposed of safely.

What products will not be allowed in school?

- Peanuts and nuts and products containing peanuts or nuts.
- Peanut butter or peanut based chocolate snacks (Snickers/ Reece's pieces etc).
- Items where peanuts or nuts are listed as main ingredients.
- Nut or peanut based oils or products.

What products are allowed?

• Items that "may contain nuts" and "may contain traces of nuts" or "made in factories that use nuts" These present a low risk and are not direct ingredients in the products.

Through their study of 'The Tempest', Year 8 explore the complexities of colonialism and imperialism through the relationship between Prospero and his slave, Caliban.

What follows is a highly -accomplished soliloquy, written by Sophiella, which explores Caliban's deep frustration at the hands of Prospero.

Caliban's Soliloquy

For all the cold carried by the wind, on Prospero fall and make his bones give into a painful stillness of winter in high altitude and spare him of no agony, so that when he should descend to reside within the smallest circle of hell, the torture shall be all the more maddening.

His spirits hear me and yet I must still curse.

But they'll not impale my fingertips with nails, knock me down upon the ground with splintered planks, tie me to place until day becomes night so the birds may prey at my skin and, if the birds so not mar my flesh enough, tear pieces from my skin in aching portions.

But for every trifle they set upon me; sometimes like phantoms, they visit me in the dark and, like a waking nightmare, whisper incessant macabre in my ears so I lay sleepless until daybreak; the horror amplified by the repeating compressions of my ribcage so all my innards squirm for freedom and nearly greet death.

When day does show itself, they do not allow me sustenance and my eyes hardly open as the spirits pry my eyes open throughout my resting nights, making it so that my eyes dry excruciatingly and have no strength to stay vigilant and avoid their tirade of attacks.
